Sanctuary Program

Welcome to Minerva and Family!

By now, gentle reader, most of you know that we have invited Minerva Garcia, and her two children (Antonio, who is 7 on Saturday, and Mateo who will be 4 in August). They are set to arrive today (Wednesday). We are scheduled to host a press conference at 10:00 am on Thursday, June 29, to make an official announcement to the public.

We have been in touch with America Friends Service Committee, who is taking a leadership role in advocacy for Minerva. Minerva lives in Winston Salem and has good community support there, including from our sister church, Parkway UCC, and our buddy church, Green Street United Methodist Church. Here is some info about Minerva and her case, taken from the Winston Salem Chronicle.

Minerva Garcia came to the United States seventeen years ago, so her blind son, Eduardo, could





have opportunities he couldn't get in the Mexican state of Guerrero. She was allowed to come for six months but never went back, hoping that she could find a way to citizenship while working with an attorney.

Since 2013, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has been granting Minerva a routine stay from removal each year. When she went to do her regular check-in on May 25, things changed. She was ordered to leave the country by June 30.

Minerva has no criminal record. Deportation would put her family in a very difficult position. She lives with her three sons, having lost one son, Diego, to cancer in 2007. Minerva's 21 year-old son Eduardo is a graduate of the Governor Morehead School, a special school for the visually impaired in Raleigh. The Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) protects Eduardo from deportation and allows him to work. He's currently a packer at IFB Solutions, formerly Industries for the Blind, and hopes to be able to work with computers there. He's also a talented musician who can sing and play guitar. Being blind, he depends on his mother's care and, like his mother, doesn't want to leave the country.

From the Associate Pastor

What Should I Say About "Sanctuary"?



We were asked to give our members and friends a statement of what you can say to someone who asks you about

our church becoming a Sanctuary church. We hope you will talk to people about what we are doing, and encourage others to get involved. What we hope you will *not* do is speak with the media, to the public, or to government authorities. When dealing with the public, we plan to have one or two people speak on behalf of the church, either Julie or Paul. Below is what you can say to people who ask. — Paul

Our church, Congregational United Church of Christ, is taking the bold step of declaring itself to be a Sanctuary Church. We do this after many meetings, much discussion, and much prayer. We are willing to accept into protective Sanctuary an immigrant or an immigrant family who has been told by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) that they must leave the country. The vast majority of folks who have been told to leave have heard this because they regularly check in with ICE. For years they have been told by ICE, "Thanks for stopping by. See you next year." The people we will take into Sanctuary are law-abiding, hard-working, tax-paying, America-loving people. They have no "home" to go to because this is home. The people we take into Sanctuary will be those who have a reasonable chance of being told by ICE that their notice to leave will be overturned. Their case is good; they just need more time to make their appeal.

Our church will be doing nothing illegal. We will tell the authorities exactly what we are doing, so we will not be harboring anyone. Everything we are doing is open to the public. The people staying with us will not be hiding; they will just be temporarily staying at our church. They are brave, wonderful people.

Our church is doing this because we take seriously the Biblical command to welcome the stranger or the sojourner. That's what Jesus said in Matthew. To quote Micah, God calls us "to seek justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God."

I hope you will go to our church's website, congregationalucc. com, where you can get more information about our church. Or I hope you will come with me to church one Sunday and see for yourself what I see — our church is a special place with special people, seeking to serve God as best we are able.
